What is a shark?

► Read this informative poster closely:

A shark is a **fish** with a cartilage skeleton that began to populate oceans over 400 million years ago. It is very old and appeared long before the first dinosaurs did.

Sharks breathe through **gills** and have 5 to 7 gill slits on both sides of their head.

They use their **fins** to swim. The **pectoral** fins on both sides of their body help them to turn. The **dorsal** fins on the upper part of their body allow them to stabilise themselves. The **caudal** fin on their tail allows them to propel themselves.

The organ that takes up the most space in their body is the **liver**, which helps them to float.

Their **skin** is hard. If you touch them anywhere from their tail to their head, they feel like sandpaper.

They have thousands of **teeth** throughout their lifetime, which are usually arranged in five disordered rows. They lose them when they feed, but they grow back.

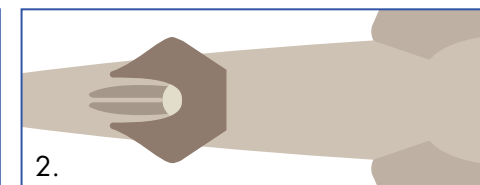
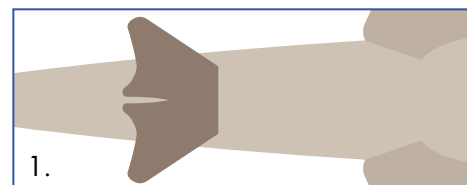


Bull sharks are **ovoviviparous** and keep the eggs inside the body of the mother. The two sharks born first eat the other eggs and continue their development, becoming strong. They will be the only ones born from the mother's belly. This process is known as **intrauterine cannibalism**.

THE STORY OF SAILOR CONSTANTINO

This is the story of Sailor Constantino, who sailed the seas with a clear goal. He wanted to find a great treasure which he had heard was hidden under the sea.

On his long journey, Constantino saw different shark species in the water: a mako shark in trouble, a nurse shark with whiskers, a 2-metre grey reef shark and the famous 5-metre long white shark. He also saw sharks in the shapes of wild animals: a 1'5 metre long leopard shark, a tiger shark and a bull shark that was almost 3 metres long. He also discovered others shaped like objects, like a sawfish and a guitarfish. Constantino always asked them all the same question, and always received the same answer.

— Hello, Mr Shark, can you help me? I am looking for treasure and I can't find it.

— Hello, Seaman, I'll tell you. Do not look for gold or jewels. The treasure you seek is closer than you can ever imagine.

He could not understand this answer, but enjoyed his journey.

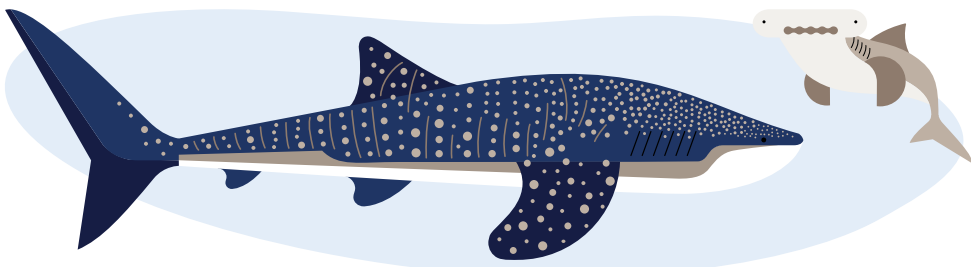




On his journey, he learned the differences between a manta and a ray. A manta's mouth is in front, between its two structures that look like horns. Rays, however, do not have these horns, and their mouth is next to their gills, on the lower section of their body.

He was also surprised to learn that the whale shark is as long as a bus (12 metres), can live over 100 years and feeds on plankton. He learned that people are, therefore, not on its menu, and that sharks are no danger to us.

He also lived an experience he would never forget. He helped a hammerhead shark that was in trouble. It could not see through one of its eyes because a piece of plastic had stuck over it. Constantino helped him to see again and learned a lesson. He realised that water was full of rubbish and thought that if humans stopped throwing rubbish into the sea, then animals would not face serious problems.



Finally, after all his experiences, Constantino understood the answer to his question. The treasure he was looking for was not gold or jewels, but something more valuable: the animals of the sea! Thanks to them, he understood the importance of protecting oceans so as to not lose the true treasure of the sea.

How do sharks live?

A DAY IN THE LIFE OF A KEEPER

► Many people work in an aquarium and care for animals. The Oceanogràfic shark aquarium is the largest in Europe. It has sand tiger sharks, sand bar sharks, nurse sharks and rays, among others. Do you want to know what a keeper does every day? Let's interview one.

INTERVIEWER: Good morning. What is the first thing you do when you get to work?

KEEPER: The first thing is to register and check that all the sharks are there.

INTERVIEWER: How do you identify each shark?

KEEPER: It's like being at school: we have one list per species with the name of each shark and the markings that differentiate it from the rest. For example, the large sand tiger shark is called Amparo. It is important to recognise them to check that they are eating and they take their medicine if they are unwell.

INTERVIEWER: I understand. Just out of curiosity, how many times a week do you usually dive in to feed a sand tiger shark? I imagine that with it being so large, it would need to eat a lot.



KEEPER: That's not the case. A few times a week is enough.

INTERVIEWER: What a surprise! People eat more often than them! In any case, there must be a risk of being bitten if you enter the water with food.

KEEPER: Well, it's a bit like me offering you the food you usually eat and you decide to eat the fork or my hand... It would be a bit strange, wouldn't it? We use a type of long metal prong to give them food and to stay alive. The shark is not as aggressive as people think.

INTERVIEWER: It's hard to believe. How do you stay under the water for so long?

KEEPER: We use a scuba diving suit and an air tank to breathe under water. When we clean the aquarium, we also spend a lot of time under water, which we couldn't do without this suit.

INTERVIEWER: Interesting! I would love to work here and care for sharks. Thanks to the animals that live in the aquarium, we can learn more about them.

KEEPER: Of course, all the information is used by scientists to improve the lives of sea animals. I'm glad that you like my work. I hope you have a good day learning at the Oceanogràfic.

INTERVIEWER: Thanks very much for your time.

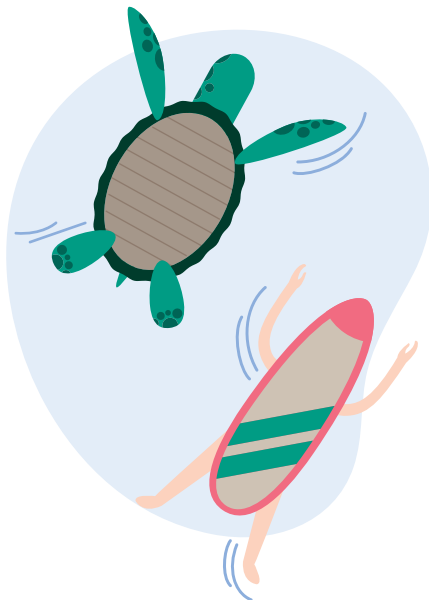

THE BAD GUYS

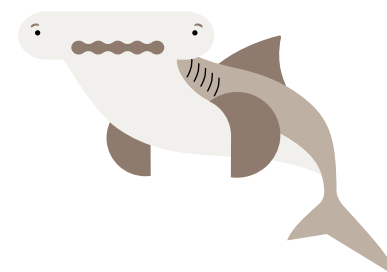

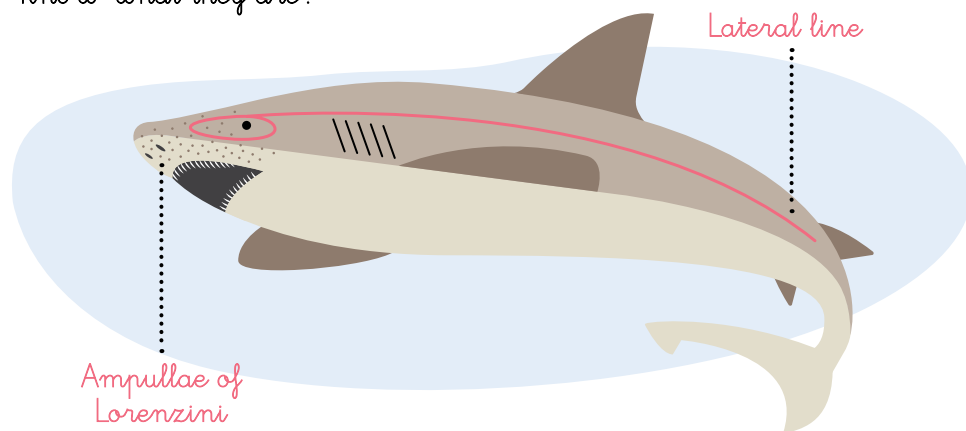

THE SEVEN SENSES OF SHARKS

Despite everything you already know about sharks, some people believe that they are more dangerous than people because they have a powerful sense of smell. However, they do not only use their sense of smell to look for food, but to also flee from their enemies or to reproduce. In addition to smell, their other senses are highly developed. They can see, taste, touch and hear. They also have a sixth and seventh sense. Do you want to know what they are?



One is on the lateral line, which allows them to detect movements in the water from long distances. The other is the receptors located around their head, used for finding prey that is buried or hidden in turbid waters.

Although sharks appear to be merciless animals, they have enemies out at sea that wish to eat them. Eating and being eaten form part of the food chain as they depend on each other to survive. These enemies are natural, but many of the threats that sharks face are caused by human beings.

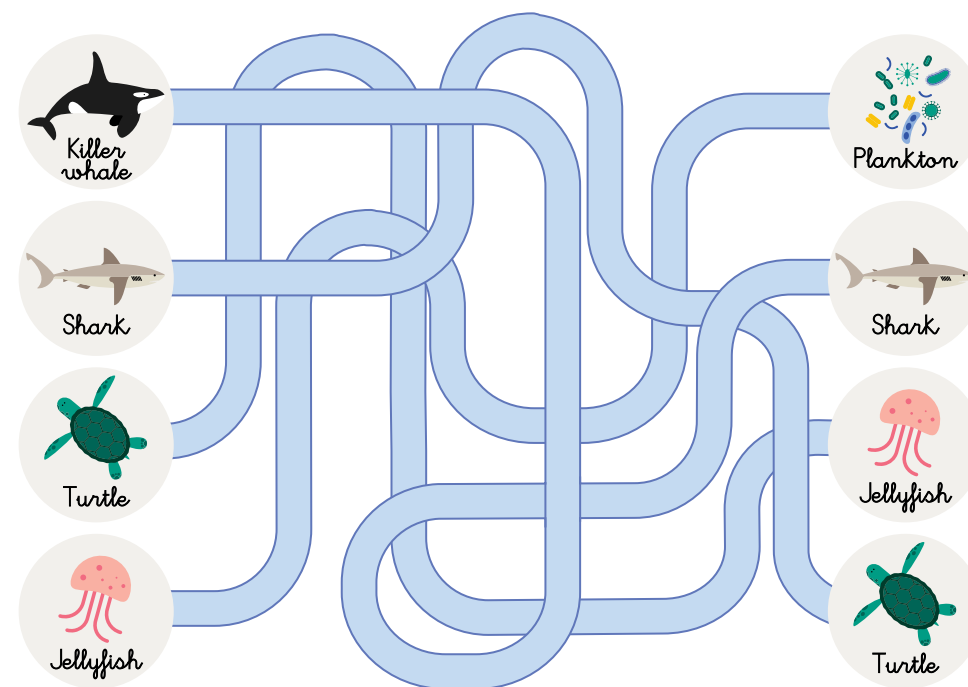
